Theories of the Atonement

Ransom

Jesus' death as a ransom to Satan to free humans from sin and death

Satisfaction

Jesus' death repays our sin debt to God (not Satan), reconciles us to God

Penal Substitution

Jesus punished for our sins in our place, God's wrath against human sin poured out on Him, imputed righteousness

Christus Victor

Jesus as victor over sin, death, and Satan

Recapitulation

Jesus succeeds where Adam failed, undoes the harm, leads us to eternal life & perfection

Governmental

Jesus did not pay a penalty for human sin; instead, at the cross he made a display of God's displeasure with sin

Moral Influence

Jesus' sacrificial life and death influences us to turn back to God

Moral Example

Jesus' sacrificial life and death is our ultimate moral example and teaches us how to live
